DIRECTOR'S NOTES

When I heard that this would be the first time Theatre Memphis had ever produced this delicate and beautiful play, I was shocked. How could it be that characters as iconic as Laura, Tom, Amanda, and their Gentleman Caller had never come to life in more than 100 seasons on these stages? And how was I honored enough to be the first director to do that? To say I'm humbled to direct this show, with this unbelievably talented team, is an understatement.

For those who know me, I am a classicist at heart when it comes to the stage. And Tennessee Williams is, in many ways, our modern American Shakespeare. The way he uses language to paint his worlds with emotion continues to be a lesson to myself and my cast as we travel through the work of bringing The Glass Menagerie to life. It has informed so many of our decisions from the design process and rehearsals, to the production of our show for you tonight.

This play is a memory play, therefore it is not entirely linear; scenes fade in and out; emotion drives what we remember and how we remember it; and all of it is painted in love — "for memory is seated predominantly in the heart." I hope, as you enter Tom's world of memory, you remember your own Amandas—imperfect in their love, Lauras—perfect to you despite what the world may see, Toms—trapped by love between family and self, and even Jims—whom we've misdirected all of our hopes and dreams onto through no fault of their own. I hope you can use the glass of our play as a lens to see more clearly the love that drives all of our behavior, whether good or bad, and the strength in how we navigate the brokenness of the world we all live in.
